1.) Objective	To present an up-to-date review for clinicians on a topic of general common interest from the perspective if internationally recognized experts in these disciplines. Focus should be an update on the current understanding of the physiology of the disease or condition, diagnostic and treatment issues.	To present key opinions on central focused topics within the field in a scholarly, thoughtful, and well-referenced. Approach should be systematic and utilize evidence-based methodology. Discussion of controversies/ opposing views of diagnosis/treatment.	To quantitatively assess whether there is a formal agreement regarding proposed statements about diagnosis, management, complications, and/or treatment <sup>1</sup> . More applicable to situations where published evidence is limited or lacking as compared to a CPG and yet there are opportunities to reduce uncertainty and improve care.	To provide recommendations for action or avoidance of action to support evidence- based practice arising from a strong, high level of evidence data <sup>2</sup> . #### **AHNS/ARS Fellow Education Collaboration**

**The Skull Base Section Edition of AHNS Journal Club** is published twice yearly online. Journal clubs are meant to be educational, covering the latest literature on various topics in skull base surgery with particular relevance to active skull base surgeons, fellows and residents. Editions typically cover a particular tumor type or topic (i.e., mucosal melanoma, or elective neck irradiation for olfactory neuroblastoma).

Editors are needed to help publish the biannual online journal club. Responsibilities include proposing a theme, selecting two to four noteworthy landmark or new articles to present and critique. Editors then publish the abstract along with their appraisal of the article for its strengths and weaknesses (typically 2-3 each).
